
# Cockburn FEBRUARY 2013 Soundings

The City of Cockburn has been named the national winner of the 2012 Keep Australia Beautiful Australian Sustainable Cities Award. The award recognises the City's commitment to improving the community's connection to the natural environment through community programs which encourage sustainability.

Mayor Logan Howlett said Cockburn's investment in renewable energy, community partnerships and management of natural areas for conservation has unmatched by any other City in the country.

"People living in Cockburn should be proud of the list of achievements which this award represents," he said.

"The path to sustainability is long but we are well on our way. For example, Cockburn already produces its own energy from the sun with the installation of nearly 600 solar photovoltaic panels on ten community buildings," said Mayor Howlett.

The City's achievements toward a sustainable future include:

• The introduction of weekly recycling. The City

- was one of the first Councils in WA to introduce weekly recycling in separate bins.
- Annual Revegetation Program: 145,000 plants revegetated in 2011-12.
- Diverse range of community programs including Get Wild About Wetlands, Deadly Tucker Program, and Indigenous Wildflower Walks.
- Partnerships with the Cockburn Wetlands
   Education Centre, Native Arc, 1st Bibra Lake
   Scouts, Cockburn Gateway Shopping City, plus
   research institutions.
- Renewable Energy Program and Greenhouse Action Fund.
- Free 'living smart' courses, Garden wise
  workshops, compost and native plant subsidies,
  sustainable home workshops and free home,
  energy and water audits to teach residents how
  to live more sustainably.
- Sustainability and Landowner Biodiversity Conservation Grants programs.

#### **ABORIGINAL WOMEN TAKE CO-HEALTH STEPS**

Aboriginal women in and around Cockburn are taking more than a few steps to improve their wellbeing. Hundreds of Aboriginal people took part in Health Screens, Co-Health events and programs in 2012. This year a range of new and existing programs are being driven by members of the community including a new Heart Foundation Walking Group with volunteer walk organiser Terri McCann. Other programs include water aerobics, water Zumba, exercise classes in Coolbellup, Ngulluk Koolbaang cook-ups at South Lake Ottey Family and Neighbourhood Centre, the HEAL program, an Aboriginal PhD study in exercise and the Journey of Living With Diabetes camps. These Co-Health programs are part of the Healthy Communities Initiative funded by the Australian Government. Co-Health programs are for anyone not in the full time workforce, single parents, those at risk of weight-related chronic disease and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. ## PARTNERSHIP WITH FREMANTLE DOCKERS TO BOOST NEW AQUATIC RECREATION FACILITY

A landmark deal with the City and the Fremantle Dockers Football Club (FDFC) will enhance the uniqueness of the proposed Regional Aquatic and Recreation Community Facility at Cockburn Central West.

The win-win partnership will enable the City to capitalise on the FDFC's investment to create an international standard facility for residents.

The facility will have a close involvement with Curtin University to conduct education, clinical placement and sports research on the same site.

The proposed facility would include:

- Outdoor 52m heated lap and competition pool, capable of accommodating water polo
- Indoor 25m lap pool
- Learn to Swim space
- Leisure Pool
- Water Slide and Splash Pad
- Water Playground
- Hydrotherapy

- Spa, Steam and Sauna
- Café
- Creche
- Kids Party and Indoor Playground
- Group Fitness and Spin Studios
- Health Club-style Gym and Cardio space
- Up to six indoor multipurpose high ball courts
- Community Office space
- Change rooms and toilet facilities
- Universal Access
- Primary AFL Oval
- High performance gym training areas for local elite athletes
- Sport performance monitoring facilities including sport science labs
- Aquatic recovery area
- · Communications centre

# How much has the City committed to the cost of the facility?

The City has committed to the revised 'base build' of \$82M for the proposed facility. The City will not cross subsidise any capital or future operating components for other parties involved. The City's cost of \$82M towards the project will remain unchanged by the integration of the FDFC. The FDFC will pay their own costs of \$25M if the facility is integrated. The total

cost of an integrated facility would be \$107M (\$82M from the City plus \$25M from FDFC).

# How will the City pay for the \$82 million facility?

The majority of the cost of the facility will come from municipal funding (from council) and developer contributions (debt funded). Grant funding is also being sought from the State and Federal Governments.





Five CCTV cameras have been installed on two of the City Ranger vehicles to assist rangers in capturing illegal incidences of dumping, parking, camping, and off-road vehicles.

Vehicles also have audio ability which assists in providing valuable information required for evidential purposes.

The valuable service provided by our rangers will be enhanced and made safer with by the installation of CCTV in these vehicles.

Information collected by these CCTV vehicles can be shared with WA Police to assist in criminal investigations.

The CCTV enhancement was funded by the WA Police Community Safety Fund.

## CITY WINS TWO CHILD AND ENVIRONMENT HEALTH AWARDS SECOND YEAR IN A ROW

The City was last year awarded a Certificate of Excellence and a Certificate of Distinction, as part of the 'Child and Environment Health Report Card Project' for the second year in a row.





### Overwhelming majority support Hamilton Hill Revitalisation

The results of the City of Cockburn's public consultation on the Hamilton Hill Revitalisation Strategy indicates more than 70% of respondents support the proposed improvements of the suburb.

In November 2012, the Council resolved to adopt the strategy which will guide how future urban infill can be delivered within the suburb to facilitate improvements in the urban environment.

Some key elements of the Strategy are:


- Proposed increases in the residential densities within the suburb from R20 to a mix of R30, R40 and R60,
- A Public Open Space Improvement Plan, and
- Recommendations for delivering improvements to the suburb's Neighbourhood Centres.

The proposed residential density changes will be implemented through Amendments No. 100 to the City's Town Planning Scheme No. 3. The City is commencing the Amendment process in early 2013.

#### **COUNCIL DECISIONS**

Council recently adopted:

- A recommendation to consider funding in 2013 - 14 for a feasibility study into a suitable location for an Ocean Pool to be located between Coogee Beach and the Island Street Groyne, South Beach. The feasibility study would also look to incorporate the inclusion of the cooling ponds at the front of the Old South Fremantle Power Station as a potential further option.
- The Playground Shade Sail Strategy 2013 -2023 which identifies a set of key criterion to guide the provision of shade sails and ensuring the continued integration of natural shade to all playground equipment. Councillors sought a review of the current strategy before committing to increasing expenditure for shade sail structures annually.

#### WHO ARE BUILDING OUR ROADS? MEET THE TEAM!

The City's Roads, Construction and Drainage Team is the crew responsible for all the new roads in Cockburn. The team consists of plant operators and hands-on labourers dedicated to building the safe roads we drive on.

The City's roads team consists of more than 25 staff servicing the entire area within the City's boundaries.

There's a lot that needs to happen before the road you see is ready for use!

First, the area of the road is surveyed and the outline of the new road is mark then the area cleared. Stakes to guide the width and level of the road gives the roads team an indication of where exactly the finished road will be once the process is complete.

Sand is then boxed out and the road is compacted to get the level right. Limestone is laid over the surface of the road and also pressed to ensure the surface is smooth and safe. The road is almost finished when the road base goes in to assist in sealing the road.

Once this is satisfactory, the road is sealed and then asphalt is laid, curbs, footpaths and islands are created to produce what you see when you're driving on one of the City's roads.



#### HISTORY WITH LEAH - HAMILTON HILL



Our popular suburban history series of articles were previously written by one of the City's valued librarians, Luba. Luba retired at the end of 2012. The City's newest librarian, Leah will now research and write these articles.

Hamilton Hill was settled very early in Western Australia's colonial history. In 1830, on his way to Mauritius, Captain George Robb arrived in Fremantle Harbour to establish a farm. He chose a 2000-acre site to the south of Fremantle as a likely spot for his farm. His farm manager was the first to use the name 'Hamilton Hill', in a letter home that August. Later in the 1840s, newspapers in the area referred to it as "that delightful locality well known as 'The Hamilton Hills'. The colony's first newspaper was printed on a neighbouring property by the man who went on to print the West Australian.

The gold rushes of the 1880s and 90s caused a boom in the colony's population, putting Hamilton Hill in a unique position to provide both food and building materials to a rapidly expanding populace.

Abattoirs and market gardens were a common feature of the area, supplying food to all the new settlers. Lime, used to make mortar,

was quarried throughout Cockburn, and the kilns built in Hamilton Hill ensured that there was enough mortar to build all the new warehouses and homes that the busy port of Fremantle and its surroundings required.

Supplying Fremantle with food, materials and labour became a theme for Hamilton Hill, with most of the industrial workers in the port city making their homes here. By the 1920s, the area had begun to modernise, and had domestic electricity connected in 1926. The introduction of cars and buses meant that Fremantle was in easy reach, and the district essentially became a suburb. Post WWII, the area was slowly turned into housing estates, creating the Hamilton Hill we know today.

**Sustainable Events Grants** assist local community groups and organisations in the provision of ongoing programs and activities for the benefit of the residents of Cockburn. The maximum grant provided to any one group will be \$7,000 over a four-year period.

**Donations** are available to provide financial assistance towards the day-to-day running costs of not-for-profit groups, not for a specific project or activity. Donations are limited and highly competitive.

**Sponsorship** is a mutually beneficial partnership arrangement where the City of Cockburn makes a financial contribution to a group, organisation or individual for a specific purpose, project, activity

or event and, in return, the City receives public recognition for its contribution. The maximum is \$20,000 for organisations and \$2,000 for individuals.

**Cultural Grants** support local arts and cultural activities. Applications to a maximum of \$4,000, with smaller amounts encouraged.

#### CITY PREPARES ITS SECOND RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN (RAP)

The City adopted its first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) in May 2011 which covered a period of two years. The Plan's vision for reconciliation is to create an inclusive community with strong relationships across cultures based on mutual respect and understanding.

The City is three quarters of the way through this RAP and has completed 93% of the actions within the plan.

- Aboriginal Cultural Awareness Training for Council staff
- A 'Good News' newsletter highlighting successes of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Bringing Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal seniors together through 'doll making'

- A feasibility study for an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in Cockburn
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people increasingly involved in physical activity and healthy eating programs
- A specific school graduation award for an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander student graduating from primary school and also awards for high schools.

The City are in the process of preparing our next RAP and has been doing this in conjunction with the local community. Community meetings have been held, along with other means of engaging Cockburn residents.
