COOGEE SURF CLUB TO BE COMPLETED FOR 2013 SEASON



Works are well underway for Stage 2 of the new Regional Surf Life Saving Club and Beach Access Node Project at Coogee Beach and on track to be finished by April 2013.

Part of the total spend of \$9.5M for the project, the \$6.5 million two-storey Coogee Beach Surf Lifesaving Club (CBSLC) will include community facilities, a gym, change rooms, meeting rooms, kitchen, public toilets and public kiosk.

The project is progressing with all walls up and the roof on. Once complete, there will be a state-of-the-art surf lifesaving club and community facility that will provide essential emergency and first-aid to Cockburn beaches, servicing more than 500,000 people.

This project is a joint venture between the City of Cockburn and the CBSLC. Stage One of the project was funded by the Commonwealth Government with Stage Two funded by the City of Cockburn, the State Government and Lottery West.



UNDERGROUND POWER WORKS KICK OFF IN HAMILTON HILL

Unsightly power lines and unreliable power will soon be a thing of the past with Western Power recently starting works to install underground power to Hamilton Hill East residents.

Underground power will not only provide a more reliable and safer power supply but will also improve street appearance and increase the value of residents' homes by removing all the distribution wires and poles.

Hamilton Hill East residents will receive a series of Advices with information regarding the various stages of work to keep you well informed. The project is due for completion in September 2013.

In 2010 the City of Cockburn was successful with its application for funding in the State Underground Power Program for the areas of Hamilton Hill East and Coolbellup East.

Coolbellup East was the first underground power project for the City, which is now complete.

This project is a partnership between the State Government's Office of Energy, Western Power and the City of Cockburn.

CITY'S SOLAR PANELS ENOUGH TO POWER 22 COCKBURN HOUSEHOLDS!

Two new Solar Photovoltaic Systems installed at the Senior's Centre and Success Regional Sporting Facility join the City's growing fleet of renewable energy systems.

The Seniors Centre received 36 solar panels producing 15,742 units of energy every year. These panels prevent 12,594 kg of carbon from entering the atmosphere. That's the equivalent of powering 2.5 average households.

The Success Regional Sporting Facility received a similar number of solar panels and will produce 13,588 units of energy a year. Since 2009, the City has installed 10 Solar PV Systems on community buildings - combined, that's enough to power 22 average households.

The City recently took home the Keep Australia Beautiful Award for 'Western Australia's Most



Sustainable City' for 2012.

The Cockburn Coast redevelopment moves into the next exciting phase with the release of two local structure plans for public comment. The two northern precincts known as Robb Jetty and Emplacement/ Hilltop precincts have been lodged with the City by Landcorp for assessment.

This does not include the old power station building, which is part of the Power Station precinct likely to be submitted at a later stage. The local structure plans are required to demonstrate how the vision outlined in the district structure plans can be achieved. If approved, the local structure plans will designate zones and density for development in these precincts.

Dreams and Stories

Over the past six weeks a group of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal women have been getting together at the Cockburn Seniors Centre and sharing some of their personal histories and stories through a unique doll-making project. Aboriginal Educator Sandy Maher was prompted to create this project after attending a Uthando doll project session hosted by the City of Stirling with a group of Aboriginal women from Mirrabooka. A participant said, "when we share our dreams and stories together we enable others to have empathy, understanding and appreciate that today we are living in a diverse culture". Through reconciliation we can bridge the gap by people living and working together and solving problems in local communities. At the completion of the project some of the dolls will be donated to Princess Margaret Hospital for Aboriginal children who come to the hospital from remote communities.

Your yellow-top bin waste will once again be processed at the newly rebuilt Materials Recovery Facility (MRF).


The \$20 million state-of-the-art facility replaces the MRF destroyed in 2009. The new facility is the result of three years of design, planning and construction.

City progresses \$82M facility at Cockburn Central

The City has taken a further step towards its plans to build an \$82 million state-of-the-art aquatic, recreation and community facility at Cockburn Central West with Council resolving to progress with detailed concept planning for this project.

The proposed facility would include:

- Outdoor 52m heated lap and competition pool, capable of accommodating Water polo
- Indoor 25m lap pool
- Learn to Swim space
- Leisure Pool
- Water Slide and Splash Pad
- Water Playground
- Hydrotherapy
- · Spa, Steam and Sauna
- Café

- Creche
- Kids Party and Indoor Playground
- Group Fitness and Spin Studios
- · Health Club style Gym and Cardio space
- 4 indoor high ball courts including show court and retractable seating with option to expand to 6 courts
- Community Office space
- · Change rooms and toilet facilities
- Universal Access

The City is proposing to develop this as an integrated development, incorporating an elite sporting club (the Fremantle Football Club) and tertiary institution (Curtin University's Sports Science faculty). If this proceeds, each partner would be responsible for its' own capital and operating costs for the development.

A Structure Plan for the precinct is being finalised by Landcorp and site works for this project could commence as early as April 2013 when Landcorp commences development of the Cockburn Central West area.





BUILDING COCKBURN - AQUATIC AND RECREATION FACILITY CONTIN...

THE FACTS

- 1. The proposed facility is not a new idea. This project has been in the City's Plan for the District for six years. South Lake Leisure Centre needs upgrading, but can't be expanded to accommodate Cockburn's growing population.
- 2. The design has been based on what the Community has asked for.
- 3. The majority of cost of the facility will come from municipal funding (from Council) and developer contributions (debt funded). Grant funding is also being sought from the State and Federal governments.
- 4. The City has a strong track record of delivering community infrastructure on budget and the project costing includes likely cost escalations for the next three years.
- 5. The site plan includes new roads and 700 car bays. The site is 600 metres from Cockburn Train station.
- 6. This project will not take money from other infrastructure. The City will continue to invest in new roads, parks and other community infrastructure. All projects in our current ten year plan will be delivered.
- 7. A facility integrated with a sporting club would allow both parties to build more cost effectively. It would also provide the community with access to more facilities and boosts our chances of attracting grant funding. Each participant would pay its own way, but be able to share some common infrastructure.

NEW BOARDWALK AT BIBRA LAKE NOW OPEN!

The City has unveiled the latest addition to Bibra Lake in the form of a new floating boardwalk.

The boardwalk is named "Narma Kullarck" a Nyungar phrase that means 'Family Place'.

City of Cockburn Mayor Logan Howlett said the boardwalk was a floating pontoon structure which avoids penetrating the lake bed which is offensive to local Aboriginal beliefs about the lake. The boardwalk is 70m long and forms the shape of a tortoise when viewed from above.

The project is part of the City's major refurbishment program "The Bibra Lake Management Plan" which is in its third year and involves education, conservation and recreational infrastructure upgrades across the entire Bibra Lake precinct.

The boardwalk can be accessed near the Cockburn Wetland Education Centre on Hope Road, Bibra Lake.



The City has received some queries from residents regarding the much publicised WA Government initiative of cat registration. Local Governments will be required to maintain a register of cats registered by cat owners.

There's still plenty of time before the legislation kicks in but here's some general information to help clear up any confusion.

When in force the legislation and regulations are likely to require:

- All cats to be registered by November 1, 2013,
- All cats to be micro-chipped, de-sexed and wear registration tags, and
- People to be over 18 years old to register a cat.

The City will publicise more details about what you will need to do once the WA legislative guidelines are completely in place.


HISTORY WITH LUBA

The suburb of Wattleup

1000 acres in Wattleup was originally assigned to Thomas Watson, a colonial surveyor, in June 1831 as a timber grant. It was later sold to George Leake, a Fremantle merchant, and passed down through his daughter to various members of the Brown family, into which she had married.

Subdivision at the western end of Wattleup commenced in 1931 when it was owned by Isadore Walters and Whitfords Ltd. Investigations during the subdivision showed that there had been a road, locally known as Wattleup Road, for the previous 30 years. It was resolved that the name be adopted officially and the area be simply named "Wattleup". In 1961 local developers, T & T Enterprises Pty Ltd, subdivided the eastern section into 4 hectare (10 acre) lots for market gardeners and proposed naming their subdivision "Wattleup Gardens Estate".

Wattleup had been an area of swamps and lakes that were filled over time. It was a place of blackboys, jarrah and paperbark trees that were cleared to establish market gardens, fruit trees, vines and pasture for cattle. Prior to the 1961 subdivision the area was prolific with wildflowers: different sorts of orchids, kangaroo paws and wattle. The lakes were full of frogs,



inhabited by tortoises and gilgies and also home to tammars, bandicoot and spotted native cats. You could even find local children paddling on the lakes in homemade corrugated iron canoes.

In the 90s Wattleup and nearby Hope Valley were earmarked by the State Government for redevelopment. This project, now rebranded as Latitude 32 Industry Zone, has seen the demolition of most of the houses in the area making way for future commercial and industrial precincts.

It's always a good idea to call the City's Recreation Team to find out first if there are other events planned or booked for the area you have in mind at least two weeks before your event date.

Then complete an active/passive reserve form to let the City know of your planned details, some things may require further notice, for example if you're having a bouncy castle, alcohol and the number of people that may attend.

It's advised by the City that there are no more than 20 - 25 people per event and bonds and fees may be applicable.

NEW CCTV NOW OPERATING AT COOGEE BEACH

If you've been to Coogee Beach lately you may have recognised some changes have occurred to the area. The City of Cockburn's Coogee Beach CCTV and Lighting Project is now installed and operational.

The pilot project is being trialled to address crime and antisocial behaviour at Coogee Beach and will act as a crime prevention tool.

The CCTV system would give the City the ability to capture and record events which can be used to assist the Police in detecting illegal activities and providing the necessary evidence. Significant upgrades have also been made to the lighting to further enhance security.

The pilot project cost in excess of \$500,000 for which the City has received grant funding from the Attorney General's Office, Office of Crime Prevention and the Western Australian Police.

Woodman Point is located approximately nine kilometers south of Fremantle on a coastline peninsula flanked by Owen Anchorage and Jervoise Bay in Cockburn Sound, and in 1836, twenty acres of this area was gazetted for a quarantine station. The first official use for quarantine was in 1886 and the station closed in 1979. It was originally destined for housing development; however in



2002 the Department of Sport and Recreation saw the potential of this area, and the old Woodman Point Quarantine Station was then declared a heritage listing. The Woodman Point Recreation Camp was officially opened on 9 October 2007.

The Friends of Woodman Point Recreation Camp Inc are a volunteer group focused on promoting the heritage of Woodman Point. 'The Friends' conduct fantastic Heritage and Historical Tours of the former quarantine station during the week and on weekends. Booking arrangements are essential, and require a minimum of 10 persons with a maximum of 30. Morning or afternoon tea is provided and light luncheons can also be catered for but must be booked in advance.
