have your say about public transport in cockburn





The forum, at Memorial Hall on the corner of Rockingham Road and Carrington Street, will provide residents with an opportunity to discuss the existing public transport network.

The pattern of public transport services in Perth's southern suburbs will change dramatically in 2007 when train services start on the new Mandurah-Perth railway.



The new Southern Suburbs Railway (SSR) will serve as the major public transport spine along the Kwinana Freeway. All bus services on the Kwinana Freeway south of Canning Bridge will be replaced by trains.

As a result, virtually all bus services through the southern suburbs, including those within the City of Cockburn, will be reviewed to ensure that the bus network maximises access to the train line and meets the broader travel needs of the community.

City residents are invited to attend the forum at any time between 12.30pm and 8pm. Representatives of the City, Transperth's Service Development Team and Southern Coast Transit (Transperth's local bus contractor), will be on hand to answer queries and discuss transport issues.

weed watch

The City's Conservation Reserves are under constant threat by invasive weeds. Two popular garden plants are now escapees that have colonised our bushland. Autumn is a busy time for weed control and it is important that the public assist by avoiding gardening with these plants and removing them from their properties.


arum lily

Arum lilies are native to southern Africa but are now a widespread weed in WA. They prefer wet, swampy habitats and form dense stands with plants growing to 1m high. They spread easily by seeds, root fragments and underground stems and the main flowering period is spring to early summer. Applying herbicide control before flowering can prevent this weed spreading. Arum lilies are poisonous to stock and humans and are a serious problem along creek lines and wet areas of south western WA.

freesias

Freesias are small perennial herbs ranging from 100-300mm high. They are a hybrid of two South African species and flower in spring with sweetly scented creamy yellow flowers. Freesias are propagated from seed or bulb-like corms. When potted plants are dumped with other garden refuse after they have flowered and died back, it helps them spread. Freesias have become a serious weed of urban bushland, coastal heath, woodland and granite rocks from Gingin to Israelite Bay. They can be eradicated by using herbicide on flowering after the corms have been exhausted.

Look out for the next issue of Weed Watch when we look at two highly invasive weeds, Geraldton Carnation and Rose Pelagonium.





broadband blackspots in cockburn

The Government has recently released an incentive for Internet Service Providers to supply broadband connection to current blackspot areas. The \$50 million Metropolitan Broadband Connect program subsidises ISPs to upgrade their infrastructure.

Parts of the City of Cockburn, including Henderson, Banjup, Yangebup and Hamilton Hill have been identified as eligible for this funding.

To focus the ISPs attention on the black spots in Cockburn, businesses and residents in these areas are encouraged to register their details on the Metro Broadband Connect Demand Register. The Demand Register is "carrier-neutral", which means the government and not the telecommunications industry operate it. To access the register, please follow the links from www.cockburn.wa.gov.au.

free living smart course

Living Smart is an environmental course with a difference. It takes a holistic approach to encourage you to make changes in your day-to-day life. Sharon Reading attended the Living Smart course in Cockburn last year and says she now considers the broader impacts of her decisions. "When I go shopping I read the labels and ask what impact the product has on myself, my family, the community and the environment," Sharon said. "I never considered those things before attending the Living Smart course".

The course is free from homework and assessment and teaches practical steps on how to reduce your impact on the environment. It covers topics such as energy and water use, waste, low chemical use, healthy living and organic gardening.

The City of Cockburn in conjunction with the Southern Metropolitan Regional Council (SMRC) is pleased to provide Living Smart free of charge to Cockburn residents. It will run for 7 weeks on Monday nights from the 15 May to 26 June between 7pm and 9pm at the Harvest Lakes Community and Environment Centre, Aurora Drive, Atwell. Enrolments are essential. prevent a rodent takeover

With the start of cooler weather the City's Health Services receive an increase in enquiries about rats and rat control. Generally, rat and mouse activity occurs in places where there is either food or a place to nest. You can reduce the chance of attracting rodents by following these steps:

- Regularly remove garden waste and other disused material from your yard that rodents might nest in;
- Remove fallen fruits and nuts from trees or palms to reduce food sources;
- Store pet food in vermin proof containers and use vermin proof compost bins;
- Install rat baiting stations around your property and monitor them regularly;
- Block any potential access points/holes around your home;
- Rodent baits and traps MUST be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions:
- Remember, baits that are attractive to rodents must be used responsibly as they will be attractive to other animals and should not be placed where children can reach them.

Contrac® Rodent Baits can be purchased from the City of Cockburn Administration Centre for \$1.65 per sachet.

Alternatively, a licensed pest control operator can help by carrying out a pest control treatment. For further information or guidance on pest control, please contact the City's Health Service on 9411 3589.
