How are traffic solutions identified?

The City uses traffic modelling to determine what the best remedies are for traffic congestion around the City.

Traffic modelling, using a specialist computer program, lets the City's Engineers see what the flow-on effects are from applying a traffic remedy to a particular street or intersection.

Traffic remedies range from traffic lights, roundabouts, intersections to anything you see which helps navigate or distribute traffic when you're driving.

We use lots of traffic data to come up with the best action take in order to make traffic improvements.

What is the City doing to fix the intersection of Bibra Drive/North Lake Road?

Main Roads WA rejected the City's application to install traffic lights at this intersection in 2010.

A practical alternative proposed by the City will be determined following the completion of traffic modelling by Main Roads WA.

This traffic modelling will also identify what impact the development of the nearby Murdoch Activity Centre on will have on roads such as Farrington Road, North Lake Road and Bibra Drive.

How will the City reduce congestion along Beeliar Drive in Cockburn Central?

The section of Beeliar Drive between Wentworth Parade and the Kwinana Freeway will be widened from 4-lanes to 6-lanes during 2013. Road capacity will be increased to reduce congestion along this busy stretch of Beeliar Drive. This project is a condition of approval for the extension of Cockburn Gateways Shopping City.

What is the City doing to fix the Beeliar Drive / Wentworth Parade intersection?

Traffic signals will be installed at this intersection during 2013 as part of the widening of Beeliar Drive. These traffic lights will facilitate a safer turn in and out of Wentworth Parade.

This project is a condition of approval for the extension of Cockburn Gateway Shopping City.



HOONING - WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Hooning is a very serious and dangerous issue and many residents are confused as to who can enforce and is responsible for assisting in eradicating hooning from their area. Hooning is a crime and can only be enforced by the Police. However, the City and WA Police are committed to working collaboratively with the community to address hooning behaviour. For example the City's security service, CoSafe, monitor hotspot areas and pass information on to Police.

This is what you can do:

Call police on 131 444 to report dangerous, reckless or anti-social driving (hoon) behaviour. All calls are treated confidentially.

Hoon Report form

Use a Traffic Complaint Report form to record the details of the incident and take this to your local police station. Remember the way a hoon may be convicted is:

- 1) Police witness the incident or
- 2) You attend court as a witness. If you are not willing to attend court in some cases your information may help to establish a pattern of behaviour that could lead to later apprehension and conviction, so your information is still appreciated.

What to report:

- Description of behaviour, eg: speeding, drag racing, burnouts, etc description of driver
- Day and time of behaviour
- Location of behaviour
- Vehicle registration
- Vehicle make, model
- Vehicle colour

You can do this by:

- · Photographic/video evidence
- Writing notes


Corporate Business Plan - Have your say

COUNCIL DECISIONS

Unauthorised commercial activities at Woodman Point - Kite surfing and other water sports

Council resolved to temporarily prohibit unlicensed kite surfing schools at the City's beaches to ensure schools teaching kite surfing at Woodman Point have the necessary qualifications, insurance and risk management plans to do so. The Council has a responsibility to ensure all activities that take place on reserves are conducted in a safe manner, firstly for those involved in the activity and secondly for anyone using the reserve at the same time. The City is working with Department of Transport, Department of Sport and Recreation, Surf Life Saving WA and the WA Kite Surfing Association to establish a Recreation and Leisure Commercial Traders Licence. The licence will be in place for the start of the 2013 summer season.

Coolbellup Town Centre Structure Plan

Council recently adopted the Coolbellup Town Centre Local Structure Plan (LSP). The intent of the LSP is to guide the redevelopment of the town centre for a mix of uses, including Residential R80, Mixed Use and Retail. The LSP has been prepared on behalf of the proprietors of the Coolbellup Hotel, but covers the whole of the Town Centre. The LSP outlines structural elements to guide the future development of the Town Centre in a way which will produce an attractive and vibrant activity centre.

CITY STARTS ITS OWN CHILDREN'S REFERENCE GROUP

To give a voice to children, the City launched a Children's Reference Group in November with 16 primary school children involved. City of Cockburn has a wide array of reference groups which give feedback to the City on issues affecting them and others in the community. The City's Children's Services Strategic Plan 2010-2015 includes an outcome "That children in the City of Cockburn are recognised, included and encouraged to participate as valuable members in the social, civic and economic life of the city". The new children's group will be a consultative group for child-related projects across the City, but also a means to develop children's interest in civic affairs.



HISTORY WITH LEAH - NORTH LAKE



For much of its history Coolbellup was closely linked to North Lake. The word Coolbellup was recorded in 1842 as the Aboriginal name of a lake in the area, but afterwards the name North Lake prevailed, both for the area and the nearby lake.

Traditionally, North Lake and its surrounds were places of great cultural importance for the local Nyungar aboriginal groups, where they set up large campsites, gathered bush food and medicine and held important ceremonies with large family groups.

In 1849, during the early years of colonial settlement, the area was leased to a Mr Samuel Caphorn, the son of a farmer, who arrived from England with his wife and nine children. The area was considered excellent for farming, and was used in large part as dairy farmland and market garden plots.

'The North Lake', as it was often called, enjoyed a 'wild west' type of infamy in the latter half of the 19th century, when its thick bushland was used on more than one occasion as a hideout for convicts escaping from Fremantle Prison, and once for Thomas Hughes, a high-profile murderer on the run. Another account tells of a group of colonial convicts breaking into a North Lake house and forcing the occupants to swap clothes with them for disguise.

In the early 20th century, the lake areas were designated native game reserves, and local men on holiday were warned against shooting there. In the 1950s, the area was set aside for state housing in the post-war population boom, and in 1957 the locality of Coolbellup was formally named as a suburb, separating it from North Lake.
