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Kwobarup opening

he State's first purpose built Aboriginal respite facilities were officially opened by Cockburn's new Mayor John Grljusich recently.

Kwobarup and Ngalla Maya are the names given to the two new developments that have been added to the existing Jean Willis Centre for Aged and Disabled in Hamilton Hill.

Kwobarup, which is an Aboriginal name

meaning good place, will provide local frail aged and disabled indigenous people with a recreational centre for get togethers and a location to hold community education campaigns.

Ngalla Maya, meaning our place, has been designed as a homely environment in which residents are encouraged to bring along familiar items such as pictures or favourite pieces of furniture which will help lessen the trauma sometimes associated with a stay in respite.

Mayor Grijusich opened the facilities at a special ceremony attended by over 100 people, who were treated to a wonderful performance by internationally renowned Aboriginal entertainer, Richard Wally.

"The opening of Kwobarup and Ngalla Maya continues the Council's ongoing commitment to assisting frail aged and younger disabled people to remain living in their own homes and communities," Mayor Grljusich said.

Construction of the new facilities was made possible

thanks to funding provided by the Home and Community Care Department, Lotteries Commission and the City of Cockburn.

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Cockburn's scenic cycleway

ockburn cyclists and walkers can now enjoy a state-of-the-art path stretching over six kilometres from Woodman Point to South Beach and connecting with an existing cycleway into the heart of Fremantle.


The dual-use path was officially opened on March 21 by the Department of Tranport's Director General, Dr Chris Whitaker at a special ceremony attended by the mayors of both the City of Cockburn and City of Fremantle, respective councillors, local members of parliament and guests from other agencies involved in the project.

"This is an ideal recreational cycling path being relatively flat and providing some wonderful scenic views along the route," Dr Whitaker said.

"Although this is principally a recreational path, we expect it will also be used by commuters who want to cycle from either Coogee Beach or Spearwood into their workplace at Fremantle."

The path was constructed by the City of Cockburn with additional funding being provided by Transport's Bikewest unit and the Department of Commerce and Trade.

The South Beach to Woodman Point section is the first regional cycling route completed under the umbrella of the Perth Bicycle Network Plan. In the future it is hoped to extend the existing path all the way along the coast to Rockingham.

Jetty to jetty proves popular

his year's Coogee Beach Jetty to Jetty swim saw a record turn out despite the stormy weather.

A total of 108 participants braved wet and windy conditions to swim the 1.6kms between the jetties at Woodman Point and Coogee Beach. The winner was Hayden Jackson in a smart time of 20 mins 24secs.

It was very much a community day with many people coming down to watch the proceedings and enjoy a hearty cooked breakfast with the swimmers. Race assistance was kindly provided by the Cockburn Volunteer Sea Search and Rescue group and the Cockburn Powerboat Association.

Medal presentations were made by City of Cockburn former Mayor, Ray Lees to Mr Jackson and the fastest female Carolyn Kezic who registered a time of 21 mins 42 secs. The short course event (800 metres) was won by Peter Hau and Vicki Wright took the honours for fastest female.

Best Effort trophy winner Les Lainsbury (68) said this year's swim was the hardest he had ever

attempted. "I made the mistake of training in calm water during the fine weather but next year I'll be better prepared," he said.

New landmark at Atwell

he recently established and rapidly growing suburb of Atwell is now the proud owner of an impressive looking community building centre.

Atwell Community Centre is not due to be officially opened until late September but is already welcoming visitors who wish to inspect the available facilities

The \$1 million Centre is situated on Lydon Boulevard, directly opposite the Atwell Primary School which is now under construction.

A health clinic nurse and a financial advisor/council-

lor are already in residence and a kindergarten is set to begin next month.

When fully operational, the Centre will also provide ample space for community, sporting and church groups to gather. The main hall will accommodate 150 people, with several multi-purpose rooms able to cater for smaller groups.

Jandakot may emulate Joondalup

\$15 million regional sporting complex at Jandakot could become a reality if negotiations with the State government remain on target.

The City of Cockburn is currently lobbying for additional funds to construct a major sporting complex adjacent to the proposed Thomson Lake shopping centre on the corner of Forrest Road and the Kwinana Freeway.

Already the City has set aside \$1.25 million as a budget to start the initial planning stage. A steering committee has been put in place to examine concept plans and develop the project further.

City of Cockburn Chief Executive Officer Rod Brown believes the complex could prove an ideal home for State teams such as the Perth Glory (soccer) and the Western Reds (rugby league).

"Preliminary discussions have already been held with the Glory management and they have indicated a strong interest in the Jandakot site," he said.

"The site will have excellent access by both the freeway and the future Perth to Rockingham rail link for people living in the northern and eastern suburbs of the metropolitan area.

"There is presently no major sporting complex south of the river and Jandakot would also be a central location for patrons living in the southern suburbs."

With the new complex being built from scratch, many of the problems associated with redevelopment of an existing stadium such as Subiaco Oval will be avoided.

Child's play now even easier

he City of Cockburn has recently installed almost \$64000 worth of play equipment in local parks for our younger residents to enjoy.

New play units were installed at Picotee Mews in Coogee and Radonich Reserve in Munster.

Extensions to existing equipment were installed at Powell Reserve in Coogee, Beale Park in Spearwood, Glenmia Reserve in South Lake and Atwell Reserve in Atwell


Plans are underway to provide further equipment to parks and public open space in Yangebup, Coolbellup and Spearwood.

"The Council has earmarked a further \$60,000 so that adults and children can better utilise our parks and public open space," Cockburn's Parks Services Engineer Rob lack said.

"Newer areas that required some playground facilities often had some basic equipment installed initially and this was then upgraded the following year as more funds became available."

"The public are encouraged to put their requests for local equipment, which could range from play units and shelters to BBQs, in writing to the Council for consideration," he said.

"As more people become aware that Council provides these facilities, a greater number of parks and reserves are being developed earlier and to a higher standard

The City of Cockburn has stopped the installation of illuminated street signs in an effort to determine their suitability.

A six month moratorium period will be used to gather community views about the erection of these signs.

An abundance of illuminated signs can be seen along major metropolitan roads such as Stirling Highway. Local examples have been erected at the intersections of North Lake and Forrest Roads, North Lake and Phoenix Roads, and North Lake and Farrington Roads.

Some concerns have be raised in the past about the aesthetic impact of large illuminated signs and Council wants to know how residents feel about the issue before proceeding any further.

pearwood public library has introduced a new facility for people interested in undertaking self-taught language learning studies.


