# introducing the city's parks services team

Parks Services (part of the City's Parks and Environment Department) is responsible for planning, designing, constructing and maintaining all of Cockburn's sports fields, parks and street gardens; that equates to more than 700 hectares of parks, grass and gardens to take care of!

This includes the mowing of grass, verges of main roads and median islands and caring for the trees and

garden beds, along with installation and maintenance of sprinkler systems, playground equipment, seats, picnic settings, signs and paths, just to name a few.

The Parks Services team does a great job of maintaining Cockburn's 202 parks, 25 sporting fields, 164 playgrounds and 53km of fencing. The team makes sure that all of these facilities are maintained at the highest standards for optimum safety, amenity and resource availability.

### speed limit reviewed

Main Roads WA advises road users that changes to the speed limit on Lyon Road, will occur on Monday 14 January 2008.

The existing speed limit of 80km/h will be reduced to the Built-Up Area default speed limit of 50km/h from Zodiac Loop to Congenial Loop and 70 km/h from Congenial Loop to Rowley Road.

The proposed changes will be implemented as part of Main Roads ongoing review of the speed limits in the metropolitan area.

Motorists are reminded that speeding is an offence.

# preparing for an emergency – help by becoming a volunteer

The City of Cockburn is responsible for preparing the community in the event of a large-scale emergency such as bush fires, tsunamis, oil spills and cyclones.

The City's Local Emergency Management Committee (LEMC) is currently in the process of adopting its own emergency management plan, and the Cockburn State Emergency Service is just one of the organisations on this committee.

The Cockburn SES is a volunteer organisation that provides emergency services. Its main role is to help clean up damage after storms and floods as well as undertake searches of missing persons and assist the fire brigade and police with traffic / pedestrian control when required.

Cockburn SES Manager Keith Drayton said the SES provided initial response to people in emergencies.

"We go out and assist those people in need and help them in any way we can to get them back on track to a normal life. This can be anything from helping pump water out of a flooded house to assisting a family after a car crashes into the front of their home."

Mr Drayton has been a volunteer with the SES for some 28 years and said there was nothing more rewarding than helping out people in your community.


# celebrating abilities

# community perceptions survey 2007 outcomes

Earlier this year, Council conducted its annual Community Perceptions Survey with a random sample of residents across all suburbs, to evaluate and monitor performance in a range of services and facilities provided by Council.

The outcomes of the survey showed that overall residents were satisfied and even delighted with the performances of the City's services particularly the City's weekly rubbish collections, fortnightly recycling collections and Library and Information Services.

The survey outcomes have provided areas of priority for Council to focus on in the short term future. Council has recently introduced a customer contact centre to improve how residents access relevant and timely information.

Council is soon to release its Corporate Governance Charter, demonstrating Council's commitment to principles addressing the main issues of accountability and community consultation in the management and decision-making process of Council.

#### **Other Positive findings**

When compared to other local governments taking part in the survey, the City of Cockburn received scores at or near the industry high in the following services areas:


South Lake Leisure Centre (79%)
Council Website (77%)
Enforcement of Local Laws & Environmental Health (67%)
Parks and Gardens (83%) and
Festivals and Events (80)

Whilst these ratings are high, the City will aim to further improve the community's satisfaction rating in next year's survey.

The opportunity to participate in the community perceptions survey is one that Council embraces as a way to keep on track with community expectations and find ways of continually increasing our service levels to a growing community.

# PHOENIX CENTRAL REVITALISATION



#### why is the city undertaking this project?


- The State Government has a new policy called "Network City" which sets out strategic direction for centres such as Phoenix to evolve into what it calls "Activity Centres". Activity Centres are more than just shopping centres; they should include a range of employment, office, retail, living and entertainment, cultural and civic activities and be supported by better public transport.
- In fill sewerage will be completed in the next couple of years and the City is aware that a large majority of residents are interested in rezoning their properties.
- The community has expressed the need for a new senior citizen's building and other community and civic facilities/services on Council's six hectares land adjacent to the shopping centre.
- The Phoenix shopping centre is currently planning on expanding to increase its retail floor space.

# the city has now completed the visioning phase of the project

The visioning phase of the project consisted of surveys of land owners, Phoenix traders and a Community Vision Forum. All of the community input is been considered as the City commences the preparation of the draft plans. These draft plans will be made available to the community for comment by April 2008.

- 4. More activities for different generations including a piazza, culture and entertainment hub and nigh time activity.
- 5. Streetscape with verge planting, greenways, walkways and street lighting.
- 6. More frequent public transport.
