

City's New Budget

Over the past few months we have had the involved process of setting the City's budget for the 1999/2000 financial year. A high priority was to ensure there was a balance of keeping costs down while still meeting community expectations of providing services, works and facilities.

Expenditure on road construction and footpath works has increased by more than \$200,000. Council has also responded to the community's needs and expectations in the parks and gardens area by increasing expenditure on parks by \$440,000 to upgrade a number of parks and allow for the ongoing maintenance of new public open space areas provided in new subdivisions.

In addition to all the services previously provided by Council, other major projects include:

• an upgrade of the filtration system at South Lake Leisure Centre (\$550,000),

•general safety and security measures for the City \$100,000).

- •a skateboard facility (\$50,000),
- •centennial celebrations (\$57,100),
- •postal voting (\$50,000)
- and the cost of the Douglas Inquiry (\$100,000)

There are many other smaller but significant items that will improve the quality of life overall for the Cockburn community. A

comprehensive list of approved items and a schedule of major works is included in the budget documents, which are available for inspection at the Council Offices, the Spearwood Library and the Coolbellup Library.

The total expenditure budget for this year is \$39.3 million. Income from rates and rubbish charges is \$18.26 and the remaining \$21 million comes from State Government Grants, license fees, contributions and interest earnings. The budget for 1999/2000 has been based on a rates and rubbish charges increase of 2.6%, which compares favourably with the projected consumer price index increase of 2.25% for 1999/00 as detailed in the WA State Government Budget. It is expected that 25% of the City's budget this year will be spent on recreation, 21% on community amenities, 16% on education and welfare, 10% on governance and 5% on law, order and public safety. Minimum rates will be \$390 for residential and rural properties and \$582 for commercial and industrial properties. The rubbish charge will be \$107. A mobile bin levy of \$27 will apply for the first four years of service for 240 litre bins and \$135 for the first five years of 1100

Rates Discount Option

Once again, Council is please to offer a discount of 5% on the value of rates. To qualify for the discount, the discount option payment amount must be paid in full by September 14th 1999.

You can pay your rates several ways - In person at Council offices, by mail, in person at Australia Post, by credit card or EFTPOS. Everyone who pays their rates within 35 days is automatically in the draw for fabulous prizes and a full reimbursement of their rates up to the value of \$700 from the City of Cockburn.

South Coogee Primary School relocataion

Parents in the Stanford Gardens area would be pleased to hear that the possible relocation of the South Coogee Primary School to Stanford Gardens in under consideration by the Education Department. The proposals are outlined in the draft Local Area Education Plan, which is currently available for comment. Copies of the plan can be viewed at the South Coogee, Coogee, Wattleup, Hope Valley and Spearwood Alternative Primary Schools. The closing date for comments on the plan is Friday, September 24th 1999.

Community Grants



In Brief...

Skateboard track

Great news for skate heads throughout Cockburn! Council has set \$50,000 on its 1999/2000 budget to construct a Skate Park. Council's Recrection Officer Andrew Ward said that preliminary discussions had been held with the President of the Cockburn Basketball Association canvassing the possibility of the skat park being constructed adjoining the stadium and managed by the Association. "The Association is keen and plans look set to be finalised by the end of 1999, with construction of the park in early 2000," Andrew said.

Beeliar Heights Area

Beeliar Heights residents have expressed concern on the level of crime and lack of community infrastructure in the area. These concerns are reflected in the views of Family and Childrens' Services and the Education Department in particular. As a result, discussions on seeking ways to address the concerns of the community are now being held with officers of these Departments, Council, the Police, Homeswest who are the developers and community representatives. A range of community development initiatives and accelerate means to develop community infrastructure such as recreation, leisure and retail facilities.

Naval Base Caravan park

The recent release of the FRIARS Report, has identified that the Naval Base Caravan Park (A Class Reserve 24308) will not be required by the State Government in the short term. Accordingly, the Government has informed Council that current leasing

arrangements may continue and that transfers of current lease holdings can take place. However, this is subject to chalet purchasers formally acknowledging the short term tenure of the leases and that the Government may issue a notice to vacate the site in the short term, which is understood to be six (6) months. Formal details of these arrangements care currently being finalised with the Department of Land Administration and will be advised when complete.

FRIARS

The FRIARS (Fremantle Rockingham Industrial Area Review Strategy report contained four options. Options 1,2, and 3a propose to retain the Wattleup townsite. Options 3b and 4 propose to replace the townsite with industrial uses. Council, at is meeting of June 22 1999, resolved to lodge a comprehensive submission on FRIARS and in this, did not support any of the Options but instead, offered two alternatives - Options 5 and 6. Options 5 and 6 retained the Wattleup townsite and also made suggestions as to how the townsite could be retained as either urban or rural. Submissions on FRIARS closed on June 30th, 1999. Council has made a presentation at the hearning organised by the WA Planning Commission and a formal response has yet to be received.

Bus Shelter Survey

The City of Cockburn would like to thank everyone who replied to the City of Cockburn Facility Survey Questionnarie. There was a lot of additional information sent in to be analysed, and will be beneficial to the future planning and development of these facilities. The results of the questionnarie and the winner of the FremantleEsplanade Prize will be announced in the next issue. Once again thank you.

Projects will be required to have two components. The first stage will be the development of the project and the second stage will be a presentation or performance to the larger community


Customer Service Officers are happy to receive your feedback on the recycling service and to assist with any problems you may be having or suggestions for the improvement of the service.



The construction of a new Regional Resource Recovery Centre at Canningvale will enable the future introduction of Mobile Garbage Bins (MGB's) for recycling. Tenders for the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) are currently out for pricing, with the facility expecting to be in operation by the end of the year 2000.

aterials Recycled include those collected each fortnight and those diverted from the landfill via the Henderson drop off centre. Trailer Green Waste at Henderson Landfill and material collected in Council's Bulk Verge Collections are stockpiled at Henderson Landfill and mulched quarterly.


Annual Tonnes of Recyclables and Greenwaste Diverted from Landfill

Recycling IIPS

- Place your recycling bags, bundled and tied newspapers, flattened cardboard and oil in sealed containers next to your garbage bin before 6.30am on the day of collection.
- Tie tops of recycling bags to help reduce litter problems
- Make sure your recyclables are clean; rinse out steel and aluminium cans, glasses and bottles, plastic containers and milk cartons.
- Crush bulky containers prior to placing in the recycling bags, so they take up less space. (Do not break glass!)
- Don't wrap recyclables in plastic bags. Place recylables loose in the recycling bag.
- Buy recycled products where ever possible.
- Compost organic waste products, or use a worm farm. (NB Council sells compost bins and worm farms at cost price).

The Swim School offers small class sizes to ensure individual attention is assured and a credit policy that allows lessons to be made up if necessary.





Midges are small, non-biting insects that live and breed in Perth's wetlands. They are of no significant human health risk, are present in large numbers during the Spring and Summer months, and attracted by bright lights. Midges are of nuisance value when in large numbers and are transported by wind away from their breeding sites.

Your Council is doing something about managing midges for you!

The City of Cockburn has an Integrated Midge Control Strategy and midge control options for different areas. If you would like a copy of the strategy or would like more information, please call the City of Cockburn Environmental Services on 9411 3445.

What can you do to help?

There are several things you can do to minimise midge problems around your home, including:

- Reducing the number and wattage of outside lights, using yellow lights or sensor security lights.
- Using outdoor foggers (insecticides), in accordance with the label, when entertaining.
- Keeping windows and doors closed, or installing fine mesh insect screens.
- Placing electrocuting light traps around your house
- Avoiding light coloured surfaces around your home as these reflect light and attract midges. Green and dark blue surfaces are most desirable.
- Screening light from the sources of midges

Underground Power Survey Results

n February this year we conducted a survey of property owners, excluding HomesWest, in Coolbellup, part of North Lake and part of Spearwood, to determine their response to contributing towards the cost of converting to underground power.

The City of Cockburn wrote to each property owner providing an overview of the benefits of underground power and advised them of their share of the likely cost and options available for payment.

The survey results are summarised as follows:

Spearwood

Number of surveys sent 2,057

Number of responses received 1,168

Response rate 56.8%

Respondent in favour of contributing to the program 383

Level of community support for underground power 32.8%

Coolbellup • North Lake Number of surveys sent 1,599

Number of responses received 905

Response rate 56.6%

Respondent in favour of contributing to the program 430

Level of community support for underground power 47.5%

While most people who responded agreed with the benefits of underground power, the cost was beyond many of their financial resources, especially those on pensions. In addition Coolbellup residents are now also faced with the cost of connecting to deep sewerage, otherwise their level of support for underground power would be higher.

In Coolbellup, HomesWest has commenced a redevelopment program of its properties. This will result in an increase in the proportion of privately owned properties in Coolbellup. Council will conduct a further survey in Coolbellup after HomesWest have progressed their redevelopment of the suburb.

However at this stage, Council has decided not to make an application for either of the localities of Spearwood, Coolbellup, or North Lake, due to the low level of community support to contribute to the Underground Power Program.

he City of Cockburn's Greening Plan Community Consultation is in full swing. Colourful and informative displays were held at Phoenix Shopping Centre and Gateways Shopping Centre during July.

A telephone hotline has been established where information about any criminal activity can be reported for which rewards may be payable. The caller can remain anonymous and is known only by a code number. This allows callers to overcome any fear of involvement or retaliation. Calls are not recorded or traced. Crime Stoppers is a true team effortan team members include the community, the Police Service and the media working together with the one goal, to fight crime in WA.

Crime Stoppers has been of great to the community in the eastern states and has served to effectively curb criminal activities and to provide information leading to the apprehension of offenders. It has strongly impacted upon community awareness of and on crimes in the short time the program has been operational in Western Australia.

It has sent out the strong message that fighting crime is everyone's responsibility, because our community's basic way of life is threatened by a rising crime rate.



Sound food news

id you know that every day in Australia 11,500 people get food poisoning? That is equivalent to every person in the City of Cockburn getting sick at least once week! Food poisoning is estimated to cost the nation \$2.6 billion a year in lost time, reduced productivity and health care. Vomiting, diarrhea and stomach cramps are just some of the food poisoning symptoms which cause 4.2 million Aussies to "take a sickie" each vear.

State and Federal health ministers are due to meet in August to consider proposed nation-wide food hygiene reforms developed by the Australian New Zealand Food Authority. Food businesses will then be required to have an approved food safety plan and all staff will need to have food hygiene training.

Many businesses in the City of Cockburn have shown they are willing to take that extra step to provide safe food to their customers by becoming FoodSafe. The City of Cockburn would like to take the opportunity to say CONGRATULATIONS to all FoodSafe premises.





"Planting started in early April to ensure the plants are ready to take advantage of the winter rains, and will not be completed until the end June," Mr Strano said.

At the completion of the project an expected 20,500 will have been planted into these conservation reserves.

The City of Cockburn intends to continue rehabilitating these conservation reserves with further plantings, and so return them to their natural state and so benefit the whole community.

Cockburn Youth Service Moves

ockburn Youth Services have moved office to the Yangebup Community Centre. The move will see the Youthwork team more centrally located within the City, and with better facilities at hand. The team of three Youth Workers is highly mobile, providing information, support, referral, advocacy and mediation to young people and their parents. The Youth Services Co-ordinator remains located at the City's Administration Building.

Change has been the theme for the team. Darren Head joins the team of Youthworkers fresh from London. The programs delivered are also under change. As a result of a recent review by the Ministry of Justice, the team no longer provides a Community Work Order service to young offenders. The new direction of this service is to concentrate on the prevention of youth crime using a community development approach and developing programs designed to provide personal, interpersonal and relationship skills; social, cultural, recreation and creative opportunities.

The Cockburn Youth Service team focus, is to not only service young people who are experiencing difficulties but more positively to support meaningful activities for young people in their local communities, and work with young people to develop their own ideas and initiatives. New focus on **pool safety**

Il private swimming pools in the City of Cockburn are set to be safer this year with the introduction of new inspections by the Royal Life Saving Society.

About 2500 swimming pools will be checked over the next year and all owner/occupiers will receive a letter providing details of the inspector's activities within their suburbs.

Inspections will begin in late August 1999 and will be conducted by Royal Life Saving Society employees Mike Watson, Luke Watson and Justin Donnelly.

State legislation requires that all private swimming pools be inspected at least once every four years to ascertain that the safety requirements are being maintained.

Royal Life Saving Society's Manager of Community Health Greg Tate said that the Society was excited by this opportunity and believed that the effective implementation of the program could reduce the incidence of drowning and near drowning.

He encouraged all pool owner/ occupiers to check safety barriers and fences before inspector's visit. Mr Tate highlighted that the Society saw an opportunity to improve this service by taking a more holistic approach to pool safety.

"While doing the inspections we will be offering the owner/occupier resuscitation courses and providing extra information brochures on pool safety".

Spearwood pool owner Sue Borcich said that with five kids, including 14-month old twins, she was paranoid about a possible drowning.

"Safety was paramount for us. The fence builders recommended a darker colour instead of cream for the fence to highlight the pool and we're really pleased with the way the pool's isolation fence looks," she said.
