

2009 preserved in time

A time capsule celebrating 30 years of Cockburn as a city has been preserved for future generations in a special ceremony at the Cockburn Seniors Centre.

Stored near the wooden honour boards, the time capsule was unveiled by City of Cockburn CEO Stephen Cain and Mayor Logan K Howlett on Monday, October 26.

The 500mm x 150mm capsule contains a computer memory stick featuring significant photographs, electronic versions of Cockburn Soundings, the 2007-08 annual report, Summer of Fun calendar, current City of Cockburn staff list and information about Cockburn's sister cities, events, developments, infrastructure and people, as well as the latest magazine version of Growing Cockburn, communications material and 30th anniversary memorabilia.

Cockburn officially became a city on October 26, 1979, after its original inception as the Fremantle District Roads Board in 1871, becoming the Cockburn Roads Board in 1955, Cockburn Shire Council in 1961 and Town of Cockburn in 1971.

"This first-ever time capsule for the City of Cockburn will provide a fascinating snapshot of how far we have come in the past 30 years as a city, preserving history for future generations to enquire about and reflect on," Cockburn Mayor Logan K Howlett said.

Works begin on Coogee Beach facility

Work has officially begun on the \$9.9 million Coogee Integrated Community Facility at Poore Grove, marked by a sod-turning ceremony for the planned development.

A joint venture between the City of Cockburn and Coogee Beach Surf Lifesaving Club, the \$3 million Stage 1a works include earthworks and site works, construction of a new car park, beach access pathways and dual-use paths, power, water and sewerage services, car park lighting, landscaped areas, fencing and gates, irrigation, shade structures, barbecues, a drink fountain and a beach shower.

The contract for the works was awarded to Industrial Roadpavers in September and \$2 million to help fund the project was provided by the Federal Government's community infrastructure program.

Subsequent stages will include the construction of the new two-storey surf lifesaving club building and community facility, gym, changerooms, meeting rooms, kitchen and public kiosk.

"Once the entire project is complete, there will be stateof-the-art surf lifesaving facilities and improved access to Coogee Beach for the public, including people with disabilities," City of Cockburn CEO Stephen Cain said.

Coogee Beach Surf Lifesaving Club president Sharee Hart said club membership had grown from 230 to 630 in the past seven years and was continuing to grow.

"As our club membership, resources and presence on the beach increases, so does our need for better facilities and this new integrated facility will help to meet that demand," she said.

The City of Cockburn has celebrated its 30th anniversary in 2009 while the Rotary Club of Cockburn has also chalked up a 40-year milestone.

With warm weather bringing people from near and far, the day-long event had an array of free activities catering for all ages such as the Incredible Creatures Animal Farm, Radio Rally Cars Off-Road Competition, Mayoral Cup Petanque Competition, Leyland Cars Celebrating 50 Years and the Mini Owners Club of WA, among many others.

Live performances came from a plethora of acts including the Ozmosis Street Band, MSJ Productions, Jelly Bellie Dancers, vocalist Eloise Kirk, acoustic guitarist and vocalist Matt Larsen, Ibis, hip hop artist Carlos Sanchez and Aboriginal dance group Wadumbah.

So when you're out with the kids, walking the dog or catching a bus and you spot some graffiti, simply grab a graffiti removal sachet and give a little rub. These special wipes remove graffiti from nearly all types of surfaces and are very easy to use.

Letting the sunshine in...



A new solar array has been added to the Cockburn Youth Centre, helping to reduce greenhouse gases and increase public awareness about renewable energy production.

The \$47,570 photovoltaic system became a feasible option for the centre, following a positive report from the Southern Metropolitan Regional Council last year, because the solar panels could face north to receive a maximum amount of sunlight.

The City of Cockburn recognised the need to invest in sustainable energy, as part of its ongoing commitment to the environment and green-friendly practices.

Low on maintenance, the solar array generates about 25 kilowatt hours of energy each day, reducing the centre's reliance on power from the State's main energy supplier.



To ensure the ongoing viability of the club, given the current weather and economic climate, the decision was made and wholly-supported by the 90 bowling members to change from a grass surface to a synthetic surface.

They also sought to enhance its standing in the Bowls WA pennant competition with the new playing surface.

The benefit of synthetic greens is:

- 1. Dramatic drop in water usage.
- 2. Eliminates the use of fertiliser and pesticides.
- 3. Surface can be played on in almost any weather condition.
- 4. Cost-saving to club.
- 5. Ability to run more community events, along the lines of the already successful Community Bowls event on summer evenings.

The City of Cockburn helped to fund the project.

Rates Roundup

The due date to pay your 2009/2010 Council Rates was 18 August, 2009, and if your account was not paid in full at that time, you should have chosen to pay by the instalment options.

Reminder notices were issued on 17 November for the next instalment payment, due on 15 December, 2009. Those electing to pay by this option method must ensure their payment is made by this date to avoid late payment penalty interest.

Council's ongoing debt collection is focusing on ratepayers who did not select an instalment option AND do not have a payment arrangement in place. It should be noted your account is now well overdue, accruing

daily penalty interest and needs to be finalised as soon as possible to avoid legal proceedings.

It is in your best interests to contact Rates Services on 9411 3444 if you are experiencing financial difficulties, in order to discuss an alternative payment arrangement.

On call to respond at all hours, they provide a priceless service to the City of Cockburn and anywhere else they are needed. In recent years, the brigade has fought fires in the South West, Jurien Bay and Kings Park.

Ongoing training in fire-fighting techniques, equipment use, first aid, four-wheel-driving and safety allows fire-fighters to become familiar with all the functions and duties required of them. Members are also able to nominate for advanced courses at the FESA Fire Training School in winter.

Cockburn Youth Centre marks its first birthday

The Cockburn Youth Centre celebrated its first year of operation with a community party on October 3, offering a cavalcade of free activities.

The first birthday celebrations included amusement rides, a skate competition, youth class performances and showcases, a barbecue, youth bands and a performance from Perth hip-hop act Downsyde.

The \$6 million Cockburn Youth Centre has become a hub for young people living and working in the area over the past year, offering a range of recreational and social programs that aim to support the personal and professional development of young people.

Since it opened, more than 10,000 people have used the centre – the largest youth facility in WA – with the majority aged between 10 and 16.


The double-level, state-of-the-art building includes a fully-equipped, soundproof recording studio, IT room with internet access, gaming consoles, a basketball ring, skate area, an all-purpose space for young people and a theatre area.

It also accommodates staff from the City of Cockburn's Youth Services, as well as other young services in Cockburn, offering a chance for young people to seek career and health advice at the same venue, as part of the centre's co-tenancy arrangement.

Other agencies working from the Cockburn Youth Centre include Youth Reach South, the Cockburn Volunteer Resource Centre, St John of God and Challenger TAFE.
