The Inquiry is finally behind us and our time as Commissioners of your city is coming to an end. We have just been sworn in again to cover the period from the official dismissal of council to when the results of the election are announced. The Minister for Local Government has set 6 December as the date for the election.

A major issue still outstanding from the Douglas Inquiry is that Cockburn has been directed to foot the costs of the inquiry of almost \$1.8 million. The Local Government Act 1995 provides that council shall pay for the inquiry if it results in any adverse findinas.

Following your resounding vote last year in support of a change to the voting format, there will be a postal form of voting at the forthcoming election and the Mayor will be elected directly by you, instead of by fellow councillors.

Because voting in local government elections is not compulsory, the level of participation can be quite low. We hope that the postal voting format will change this and that voter participation will be very high.

Of concern is that low participation levels, sometimes result in a minority group achieving quite formidable power by an organised turn-out to vote. Therefore it is extremely important if you want the government you deserve from your council that you play an active role in the election and monitor the candidates' performance by keeping in touch with what is happening.

We urge you to participate in the forthcoming elections.

Another NIMBY Issue - (Not In My Back Yard)!

There are quite a few contentious issues evoking emotive responses within the community at the moment but the one that seems to be causing the most vocal reaction is the placement of mobile phone towers.

Council frequently receives applications & at the moment at least two other applications are being considered.

Submissions in opposition to these applications is usually based on one of two premises:

- The fear of health risks associated with emissions of electromagnetic energy (EME) and
- The visual impact of mobile phone towers.

The Planning and Development Services department of Council has thoroughly researched both these issues.

Emissions of EME

From a facts sheet issued by the Electromagnetic Energy Public Health Committee (part of the Australian Government Department of Communications and the Arts) makes the following statements :

"The weight of national and international scientific opinion is that there is no substantiated evidence that living near a mobile phone tower causes adverse health effects."

"The Australian Standard AS2772.1 has established exposure limits to EME. EME from a tower is far below the Australian Standard (a maximum of 0.2% of the limit) as at 100 metres from the tower."

and

"EME has been around for 100 years or more, when wireless telegraphs were developed."

In addition studies of EME in the atmosphere undertaken by the Australian Radiation and Nuclear Safety Agency indicate that mobile telephone base stations contribute a mere 10.99% of the EME with much higher percentages of 26.37% coming from FM radio and 50.55% from AMA radio.

Visual Appearance

A lesser reason in objecting to the siting of mobile telephone towers is the unsightliness of them. Council Policy PD32 on "Location of High Voltage Overhead Power Lines and Microwave Towers" states:

- "The siting of mobile telephone towers is to be located where possible within industrial, commercial
- or other non-residential zoned land within the district and as far as possible from any residences."

Council officers always ensure that all available research and results available are thoroughly studied and understood before making recommendations to council. It is also important to note that in cases where the phone tower is deemed as "low impact infrastructure" the council has no say in their placement.

An example of this situation is the mobile phone antenna, which was recently secured to the Phoenix Shopping Centre. Because it was secured to an existing structure it was not considered to be high impact and therefore the mobile telephone company only had to adhere to Federal Legislation and did not have to go through council for approval.

There is no doubt this will continue to be a controversial issue as applications continue to be made by the telephone companies as they upgrade their city networks. Council has and will continue to weigh the merits of each application based on the most up to date information available but also to ensure that our planning decisions are based on: "an approach which has the potential to achieve high levels of convenience for its citizens". (from the City of Cockburn Corporate Strategic Plan).

Cockburn's Very Own BMX Track


Young people throughout Cockburn put their heads together and with the help of Recreation Services and the Environment Department, they designed and constructed their very own BMX track.

Azulejo Assembled Memories is a community based Public Art project that involves the creation, construction and installation of ceramic sculptural seatings which will be permanently placed in key locations in the City of Cockburn and Fremantle.

The project received a community grant from the City of Cockburn for \$10,000 which will help to fund the sculptural seating planned for Cockburn, Fremantle and a sculptured wall for South Fremantle High School.

Through collaboration with the local government, community groups and organisations, Azulejo Assembled Memories plan to run a series of workshops where artists will share their knowledge and expertise in the areas of ceramics, Maiolica and mosaics.

The theme of The Family in its various interpretations are explored and interpreted visually with these media. The project will be managed by a steering committee of artists, community members and local government representatives.

After extensive community consultation Bibra Lakes has been identified as an ideal location within the City of Cockburn for the Azulejo Assembled Memories Project.

LOCAL AGENDA 21 What is it?

Local Agenda 21 (LA 21) is a program aimed at implementing sustainable development at the local level. LA 21 programs consist of systems and processes that integrate environmental, economic and social development. LA 21 will create a strong partnership between local government and the community with the aim to develop a long-term strategic action plan to progress towards an agreed future direction. It is a vision of sustainability and the goals and targets of LA 21 should set the direction of all council activities.

Where did it come from?

In 1992 the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED) known as the Earth Summit released Agenda 21. Agenda 21 is a blueprint action plan to achieve sustainable development. Agenda 21 called upon governments from around the world to implement the blueprint. Local Agenda 21 comes from chapter 28 of that blueprint. Chapter 28 implies that many of the problems and solutions being addressed by Agenda 21 have their roots in local activities. Therefore the need for local authorities to cooperate and participate in Agenda 21 has been well recognised.

Why should we have it?

There are many potential benefits for undertaking LA 21 including:

- Managing change more effectively
- More effective policy development
- Enhanced capacity to meet community needs
- Greater community cohesion
- Stronger regional links
- Cost savings
- A healthy and vibrant community

Planting for the Future

As part of the revegetation program for conservation areas the City recently arranged a number of school and community planting days at various reserves within the municipality.

The following day was a community planting day at the same location. More than 25 people from the surrounding area attended and helped to plant a variety of native species including local paperbarks, gum trees and acacia. In all over 400 plants were planted around the perimeter of the lake.

On Sunday 18 June, it was Manning Lake Reserve's turn. This was arranged with the help of the Friends of Manning Park Lake. Although weather conditions were not ideal, more than 35 people attended and managed to plant over 1300 reeds, rushes and paperbarks near the lakes' edge.

Students from Newton Primary School enjoyed a few hours of planting at Market Garden Swamp on the second last day of term. Again the enthusiasm of the students was fantastic and more than 250 plants were placed within the reserve.
