Cockburn a strong chance for the Dockers' home

he proposed Thomson Lake Subiaco-type football stadium could be the long-term, future home for the Dockers!

It is now under consideration as one of five options the West Australian Football Commission are looking at for the Dockers base. The other places being looked at are Fremantle, East Fremantle, Subjaco and the WACA ovals.

The Commission have contacted Cockburn's Chief Executive Officer, Rod Brown, asking the City to address certain selection criteria for the home base.

"We believe it would be an ideal site for the Dockers for many reasons, especially because of the future transport access and the WAFC should take hold of this opportunity," Mr Brown said.

The proposed Thomson Lake Sports Stadium, located 12 kilometres south east of Fremantle and 20 kilometres south of the Perth CBD via the Kwinana Freeway, is presently on the drawing boards and will be part of a major new regional centre.

Cockburn's Mayor and former East Fremantle premiership player John Grljusich said that there was no major sporting complex south of the river and that this was the perfect opportunity for the WAFC to base a southern suburbs AFL team in the heart of the south metropolitan region.

The master plan for the City Centre incorporates the development of multi- purpose sporting stadiums and support facilities, a business park precinct, a major shopping centre with 50,000m² floor space, and a town centre combining office, community, government, entertainment, restaurants, and cafes, shop areas, a showroom

and mixed residential uses.

Two planning studies completed both stated that the Thomsons Lake City Centre site should be seriously considered as a most suitable for such a major sporting complex.

Mr Brown said that the design of the sporting venue would be able to meet the long term needs of the Dockers, in terms of the ideal size of playing field, warm up and training areas, players and administration facilities, seating capacity, and parking.

"The site is well located adjacent to the regional road network, Freeway, and the future Perth to Mandurah rapid rail system for easy access,' he said

"The Thomson Lake City Centre at Jandakot is a unique site offering enormous development potential for regional sporting and business activities," Mayor Grljusich said.

Road Art Exhibition comes to city

n a bid to increase awareness about road safety with teenagers, the Road Art Express Exhibition will be coming to the Cockburn Civic Centre from Wednesday November 5 to Friday November 7 1997.

Local high school students will visit the exhibition, which consists of 50 block mounted posters with road safety messages about young drivers and an audio visual display featuring "RAW", a Road Awareness Workshop 1997 video coordinated by the office of Road Safety.

The road safety posters were designed by year 9 to 12 students from schools throughout Western Australia as part of a state wide competition for pre probation drivers.

"There were a lot of messages about drink driving and lack of experience," RoadWise Project Officer

Over 90 entries were received. The 50 that have been block mounted will be displayed at nine different metropolitan areas.

The message on the winning poster designed by Kate Griffith from Ocean Reef High School says: "Whoever said practice makes perfect lied but experience helps".

"The response to the competition was good for a first time and it will now become an annual event," Ms Nulty said.

Despite the campaign to increase awareness of safety on the roads with young driver, the number of fatalities and serious injuries suffered by young drivers as a result of road accidents has increased in WA.

The exhibition will open in the Perth Town Hall on October 20, 1997.

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Revolutionary technology draws Korean engineers to Cockburn

team of senior engineers from Seoul, South Korea, visited City of Cockburn's Henderson Landfill Site to see a new leachate treatment plant pilot facility in action and discuss the technology.

Landfill leachate is the liquid wastes generated by a landfill and collected by the lining system.

Henderson Landfill set new standards for reducing the impact of landfills on the environment in Western Australia when it became the first HDPE (High Density Polyethylene) lined landfill in Australia.

"As part of our continuing commitment to operate the site in line with world's best practice, the City of Cockburn recently awarded a contract for the construction of a landfill leachate treatment plant to a local Perth company, QED Australia," City of Cockburn's Director of Engineering Bevis Greay said

The treatment plant will remove nutrients and contaminants from the leachate to such a standard that it can be used for irrigation purposes around the landfill site or be allowed to discharge directly into the groundwater, meeting with all environmental requirements set by the Western Australian Department of Environmental Protection.

In unlined landfills, this was allowed to enter the groundwater and pollute it.

The engineers from Kimpo will visit the site to view the QED test facility in operation and to assess the plant's suitability for use at their site, the Kimpo Landfill, being developed for the City of Seoul.

Kimpo landfill will be the world's largest landfill facility when fully developed.

"This revolutionary treatment technology has great

potential both in Australia and worldwide," senior engineer for installers and managers of the plant Halpern Glick Maunsell, Ian Barker said

Landfill leachate is a highly contaminated solution, potentially toxic to normal biological processes, however the combination of two technologies provided by QED will allow the effective treatment of this problematic waste stream.

Henderson Landfill began operation in late 1989 and has a projected life in excess of 20 years.

"Currently approximately 70,000 tonnes of waste per year is deposited on the lined waste cells, with a total of 400,000 tonnes already contained on the site," City of Cockburn's Wastes Services Engineer Rob Jack said.

\$20,000 study for city coastline

detailed Integrated Coastal Management Plan of the City's coastline is being prepared thanks to a \$20,000 grant from the Ministry of Planning's Coastwest/ Coastcare program.

The objective of the study is to produce a comprehensive plan detailing issues about the management of the City's coastline and identifying the coastal recreational needs and facilities which are required.

"The funding was requested in order to carry out a management planfor the coastal areas of the City, and to integrate issues relating to environmental management, the social and recreational usage,

cultural attributes and community involvement," City of Cockburn's Environmental Services Manager Darren Walsh said.

A consultant will be appointed to prepare the management plan and a steering group which will include City and community represen-tatives, and relevant interested groups and government agencies. If

Cockburn's youth call for action

The City of Cockburn Youth Advisory Council called on the state and federal governments to implement education awareness programs to help reduce the number of youth suicides in Australia.

The action came following the conclusion of the inaugural Australian Youth Forum held in Canberra in September.

More than 300 young people across Australia, ranging in age for 16 to 21 attended the conference and urged the nations leaders to take the time to listen to their views.

Nine Junior Councillors form Cockburn attended the Forum in Canberra, accompanied by Clr Sarah Hunt and council's Youth Services Coordinator Orietta Simons, through funds provided by the City of Cockburn and Sims Metal, as well as their own fundraising efforts.

"They returned with a stronger sense of how to address issues such as youth suicide, unemployment, youth rights and racism at a local and state level," Mrs Simons said.

One of the recommendations that came from the

Forum was the establishment of an Australian Youth Congress, designed to represent the views of all young Australians.

"What the forum was about was getting politicians to realise that our young people are not only Australia's future, but that they can and should be active participants in policy and development today," 18 year old forum organiser JJ Kahla said.

He said that a pleasing aspect of the forum was that it proved problem solving and decision making can be far more successful when it is based on bi-partnership.

"The city of Cockburn Junior Councillors played an integral role in defining Australia's vision for the future and the Cockburn community should congratulate them for both their initiative and expertise," Mr Kahla said.


